FROM THE DIRECTOR

At the end of 1999-2000 we had said that we would like to create a position for ourselves in management education and also would like to explore opportunities in the international market. Our vision, as was mentioned earlier, is to be a leader among world class management institutions impacting organizations and society through innovative excellence inspiring pride in the stakeholders. We had mentioned that the agenda that we had set last year was to (a) invest significant funds in acquisition of knowledge resources and technology resources from the global market, (b) identify the best of the international business



schools like INSEAD, Columbia, Babson College, Berkeley, and Harvard for international linkages, (c) go international through recruitment of foreign students to the PGP and Fellowship Programmes, invite international faculty either on sabbatical or short contracts, offer online executive education programme to executives in global markets and work with other IIMs to set up an offshore campus in one of the Asian countries, (d) attract and invite some of the best professionals in academia and industry to be a part of the Institute's core faculty team, (e) accelerate the process of campus development with the target to be in our own campus at the start of the academic year 2002, and (f) make the IIM-I a place to be loved and an exciting place for study and work. The performance during the year 2000-2001 should necessarily be considered against the above backdrop. Before I present the detailed report, let me present the following highlights of 2000-2001:

- The most significant achievement of the year was the allotment and possession of all the 193.4 acres of land for our campus construction which was earlier embroiled in a whole lot of political and legal crises. We were able to get the controversies resolved and the land was formally handed over to us on September 30, 2000. On October 17, 2000, the High Court of Madhya Pradesh gave orders for removing the T.B. Sanatorium from the land and housing the patients at the Manorama Raje Hospital in Indore. The High Court also said that the Government of M.P. should notify the public that the Sanatorium no longer existed. On 18th of October, the Sanatorium was demolished by the district administration and notification issued. Immediately after that the land was demarcated and the work of awarding the contract got off to a start. Earlier, M/s. Suresh Goel & Associates, Delhi were appointed as architects for the campus. In March 2001, it was decided to assign the contract of construction of the campus to M/s. Simplex Concrete Piles (India) Limited, Mumbai who have already started the construction of the work.
- On 19th April, 2001, the Institute's Post-Graduate Programme got the recognition from the Association of Indian Universities as equivalent to MBA degree of an Indian university.
- The Institute launched its Management Development Division and achieved moderate success. It conducted 8 programmes during the year and generated a total revenue of Rs. 10.87 lakh.
- In the first ever rating of IIM-I done by Business Today, we were ranked No.8 among the top business schools in the country. Earlier, another study done by Cool Avenue

and Business Today on Placement put us at No.5. We can thus rightfully claim to have broken the threshold level of recognition.

- The students organized for the first time their annual festival called IRIS.
- Dr. Biswajeet Pattanayak was offered the AICTE Career Award for Young Teachers for 3 years by AICTE. AICTE will meet his salary and allowances during the tenure of the award, and will also release a research grant of up to Rs. 3 lakh.
- GE identified 15 national institutions in the country for the purpose of award of their scholarship. IIM Indore was one of these 15 national level institutions.

Post-Graduate Programme

As I mentioned earlier, our PGP has been recognized by the Association of Indian Universities as equivalent to an MBA degree of an Indian university vide their letter No.EV/II(854)/2001/15446 dated 19th April, 2001. This will provide to our students the opportunity to undertake research and other advanced degree programmes both in India and at foreign universities. The Programme gained acceptability and recognition from the industry particularly because of its experiential learning component as also its IT focus.

Admission

The number of students appearing for interviews and finally registering has continuously been increasing. This year 716 candidates appeared for interviews out of 800 who were called. Three hundred and sixty three offers were made. Sixty nine candidates accepted the offers and 61 finally registered for the Programme. The 8 candidates who did not register joined IIM-L and Faculty of Management Studies, Delhi University.

Campus

As I mentioned earlier, the Institute was handed over clear title and possession of the 193.4 acres of land originally allotted to the Institute at Pigdambhar at Rau but was embroiled in political and legal controversies. All possible attempts were made to shift the T.B. patients but unfortunately none of these succeeded. In August 2000, some of the interested groups

got into the act and tried to create a case of IIM Indore getting the land at the expense of the TB patients. I took up 'the matter with the district administration as also with the Chairman and other members of the Board. It was decided to hold a press conference and put IIM-I's point of view to the public, which was done in September 2000. Soon thereafter, the hearing of the case in the MP High Court was advanced and on 17th October 2000, the High Court allowed the MP Government to close the TB Sanatorium and hand over the land to us for construction of our permanent campus. However, in order to prevent any kind of action at the Supreme Court level, we also filed a caveat in Supreme Court. On January 19, 2001, the writ petition challenging the High Court order was also dismissed by the Supreme Court. The writ was not even admitted for hearing.

Subsequently on February 7, 2001 we floated tenders inviting bids from the pre-qualified construction agencies for construction of the permanent campus. Eight out of the 9 pre-qualified agencies submitted their bids. The contract was awarded to M/s. Simplex Concrete Piles (India) Ltd. for an amount of Rs. 44.75 crore. The total area to be covered under construction is 35,000 Sq. Mtrs. and we hope to have the following facilities ready for occupation by March 2003:

1. Academic Complex

2. Students' Hostels

3. Library

In addition to this, a 4100 Mtr. long boundary wall and road network covering an area of 3050 Mtrs. would also be completed. The campus will be: (a) intelligent, (b) environment friendly, (c) disabled friendly, and (d) energy efficient. The other features of the campus are as follows:

- The campus has been designed as a concentrated complex and buildings sited accordingly with a view to reducing the cost and optimum utilization of space.
- Only those buildings will be built which are absolutely essential for the next 5 years.
- Construction work will be undertaken only in an area of 35,000 Sq.Mtr. as per the guideline laid down by the EFC.
- As per the EFC, modern office equipment and communication facilities have been planned out on the campus which will help us reduce the recurring cost on manpower.
- Communication network is being outsourced to one of the telecom companies. Negotiations are already on with BSNL and Bharti Telecom who will be willing to provide to us the necessary cable network and other facilities free of cost.
- Satellite Earth Station will be set up with the help of STPI and VSNL. Hopefully, it will be available to us free of cost much the same way as we have been able to source the video conferencing facility for the Institute from Bharti Telecom.

The salient features of the agreement entered into with M/s. Simplex Concrete Piles (I) Ltd. are as follows:

- Fixed rate contract
- Fixed time contract of 21 months
- No escalation cost for 21 months
- No advance to the firm except mobilization advance which has been limited to Rs.50 lakh, and that too against a bank guarantee of Rs.1 crore.
- Security deposit for the entire construction period and until the expiry of defect liability will be Rs. 2 crore.
- A composite contract covering civil and electrical work, landscaping, road network,
 HVAC, and services required on the campus.

The Institute has sent a detailed proposal to the Government of India for providing the necessary financial support for the campus construction.

International Linkages

On my way back from the University of Helsinki where I had gone to present a paper on Internet and Indian Economy, I visited INSEAD. I had an opportunity to discuss with the faculty members there and the Dean the possibility of IIMI establishing academic linkage with INSEAD. Dr. Soumitra Dutta, Dean, who has been coordinating my visit to INSEAD welcomed the idea of collaboration and we are further working on it.

The idea of collaboration is in line with the commitment that I had made on creating linkages with the best international schools like INSEAD.

All in all, the year 2000-2001 was a year of achievements and confirmation of our road map by our stakeholders. We have still a long way to go. We will not rest until the time we have fully achieved our vision. The years ahead for us will be far more challenging. These will see our expansion in executive education, doctoral programme, and faculty development. The year 2000-2001 will see us expanding our operations internationally. We therefore feel excited at the future opportunities that are now knocking at our door.

POST GRADUATE PROGRAMME

Sixty two students registered for the 2001-2003 batch of the Post Graduate Programme in Management. Forty one participants were promoted to the second year of the programme. All 37 participants of the 1999-2001 batch satisfactorily completed the academic requirements and graduated from the Institute.

Orientation Programme

The orientation programme for the new batch of students was held from June 21 to 23, 2001. Orientation programme was addressed by Mr. B.S.Nagesh, Managing Director, Shoppers' Stop Ltd. Mumbai. He emphasised the need for paying attention to the customers, developing long term relationship with the customer, and remaining in touch with the ground realities prevailing in the context of each business.

The re-orientation programme for the second year was held on June 29, 2001. Mr. Ashok Wadhwa, Managing Director, Ambit Corporate Finance Private Limited, was invited to address the second year PGP participants, on the reorientation day. In his talk, Mr. Wadhwa, delved upon his experience in the corporate life and also the process of metamorphosing into an entrepreneur. He emphasised that to be a successful manager and entrepreneur, one must imbibe the virtues of values, ethics, morality, risk taking, and result orientation. He further said that being successful is as important as being highly ethical and moral in one's conduct and character. Risk containment is as critical as risk taking was the message of Mr. Wadhwa to the second year participants.

Highlights of Activities

In two respects, IIMI's academic programme is distinct from the programme of other management institutions in the country. The first relates to modular approach. The basic premise of the *modular approach* is that organisations are built around a set of inter-woven activities of acquisition of resources, conversion of resources to marketable products and services, in the process serving a host of their stakeholders. The modular approach is built around a combination of functional approaches, value chain activities and stakeholders' perspectives through various carefully designed and inter-linked modules. It also facilitates collaborative effort among faculty as they teach in terms. The second uniqueness is *experiential learning* (EL). Spread across the entire two-year curriculum, EL has three components: industrial training in the first year, summer training on the completion of first year, and organizational project in the second year. The objective is to provide the students early real life exposure to organisations and to enrich the learning experience through simultaneous inputs from theory and practice.

Curriculum


The first year package consisted of 35 modules, spread over three terms, having 104 credit units. All modules were compulsory. For every 6 sessions, one credit is assigned to a module. While a course may consist of several modules of varying credits, typically a 4-credit module consists of 24 sessions. In the second year, participants were allowed to take a minimum of 61 credits and a maximum of 65 credits. The package consisted of 4 compulsory courses of 21 credits; remaining credit requirements were fulfilled from across 35 electives and Courses of Independent Study (CIS).

Scholarships and Gold Medals

- Mr. Vishal Keswani was awarded Kalyani scholarship of Rs. 2,00,000 and the "Indian Institute of Management Indore Medal for Scholastic Performance" at the Convocation.
- Mr. Amit Gairola was awarded Bridgestone Scholarship of Rs. 1,00,000.
- Mr. Bankim Mitra was the recipient of Eicher Scholarship of Rs. 50,000. He was also given Eicher Gold Medal and a cash prize of Rs. 5,000 for All Round Best Performance.
- Mr. Prashant Kumar was awarded PMSI Scholarship of Rs. 50,000.

Annual Convocation

The second Annual Convocation was held on March 25, 2001, at which 37 students were awarded the Post-Graduate Diploma in Management. Padma Bhushan Dr. Abid Hussain delivered the Convocation address. In his address Dr. Abid Hussain impressed on the graduating students the need to hear the footsteps of history and follow them to compete with the very best in the new world order where speed is the order of the day. Many more skies are there to be conquered beyond the visible sky. He also exhorted the students to fight against the evil that lurks in our hearts and become a better human being and an asset for the society.








PLACEMENT

Final Placement

Final campus placement -2001 was held during February 21-23, 2001. In all 46 companies were slated to participate in the final placements but only 34 could be accommodated, as companies lapped up the students. A total 89 offers (including 12 international offers) were made over two days. Students had multiple offers with an average of 2.48 offers per student. All 37 students were placed in 32 hours.

Summer Placement

Summer Placement 2001 also received good response from companies. In all 23 companies participated in the summer placement programme. All 41 students were placed by January 2001 itself.

LIBRARY


Infrastructure Facilities

Library has a CD-NET Server with 28 CD Drives and another Pentium II 350 MHz with 128 MB RAM, 3X9 GB HDD server to host all the library databases both CD and Hard disk based. All the databases have been web enabled and made available on the Institute Intranet. Every functional unit has been equipped with a network computer to enable smooth information flow. Also, there are two computers kept inside the library to facilitate the search requirements of the users during their visit to the library. Library also has a VCR and Xerox facilities.

MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES

The Management Development Programmes at the Institute were started during the current academic year 2000-2001. Eight programmes were successfully conducted. One hundred and eighteen executives from private and public sectors and government departments participated in these programmes. 

INCUBATION CENTRE

A Business Incubator Unit (BIU) was set up at the Institute to promote entrepreneurship. Mr. Paresh Thakkar of Infinity Ventures, Mumbai formally inaugurated the Unit on February 5, 2001. The aim of the BIU is to provide the necessary infrastructure facilities to enable conversion of new business ideas into viable business ventures. The Unit will provide computer facilities, assistance in conducting business feasibility studies, access to information and data sources on emerging businesses, and help in carrying out test marketing and gauge potential customer response and networking to access venture capitalists and other sources of capital. The residency period at the BIU will be 6 months to one year.

FOUNDATION DAY LECTURE

The First Foundation Day Lecture of the Institute was held on October 3, 2000. Prof. S.L.Rao, Chairman, Central Electricity Regulatory Commission delivered the lecture. Prof. Rao spoke on "Business Ethics in a Competitive Economy". Prof. Rao, in his lecture, said that ethics related to the rules recognized in respect to a particular class of human actions. So when one talks of business ethics, one refers to a set of rules of conduct, either explicit or implicit, which are generally accepted by business and society as the desired rules of conduct. Competition in business, Prof. Rao said, while it benefited one might hurt another, which was not necessarily unethical conduct. It is merely competitive behaviour. Competition provides choice to the consumer and when choice is restricted, it is anti-competition and so unethical.

F. Retirement Benefits

Leave encashment benefits to the staff is accounted on cash basis.

G. Foreign Exchange Transactions

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are accounted at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of transaction.
