

Post-Graduate Program

The fifth batch of PGP (2002-2004) comprising 59 participants was admitted to the Institute in April-May 2002. Sixty participants of the 2001-2003 batch satisfactorily completed the academic requirements and graduated from the Institute. Fiftyeight participants of the 2002-2004 batch were promoted to the 2nd year of the program.



Registration and Orientation Program

The registration and orientation program for the fifth batch (2002-2004) of students was held from June 20 to 22, 2002. Mr. Raman Madhok, Managing Director and CEO, Jindal Iron & Steel Co. Ltd., Mumbai addressed the program.

The registration and re-orientation program for the fourth batch (2001-2003) was held from June 27 to 29, 2002. Mr. Vinay Chajjalani, Managing Director, Web Duniya addressed the second year students on the re-orientation day.

Highlights of Activities

The two courses, i.e., Experiential Learning (EL) and Society, Business and Management (SBM), make IIMI's academic program unique. Divided into three components, viz., industrial training during the first year, summer training at the end of first year and, organizational project in the second year, EL is spread over two terms. The main feature of EL is its practical approach to the real life of an organization. The participants apply their classroom learning in all the three components.

SBM course is a step towards helping the society. As a responsibility towards society, IIMI encourages its 'to be managers' to take up projects related to the upliftment of the poor, rural development and related projects in the second year. Projects done under SBM brings a great deal of learning and experience to participants.

Curriculum

The first year package consists of thirty courses, spread over three terms, having hundred credit units. All courses are compulsory. For every six sessions, one credit is assigned to a course. A four-credit course consists of twenty-four sessions. In the second year, participants are allowed to take a minimum of fifty credits and maximum of fifty-four credits. The package consists of three compulsory courses of fourteen credits; remaining credit requirements are fulfilled from across forty-six electives and Courses of Independent Study (CIS)

Annual Convocation

The Fourth Annual Convocation was held on March 28, 2003, at which 60 students were awarded the Post-Graduate Diploma in Management. Padma Vibhushan Dr. C. Rangarajan, Chairman, Twelfth Finance Commission, delivered the Convocation address. He said that a new productivity culture must emerge, along with an organizational structure and an incentive system, so as to promote productivity.

In his address, he said that youth is full of idealism and ambition but he went on to caution against idealism without ambition that did not achieve much. On the other hand, he said, ambition without idealism may also be dangerous and students must combine the two in right proportion.

Speaking on the shifts in the industrial policy paradigm in India, he said that it was time to recognize that the challenges of the new century demanded action at the enterprise level as well. They had to learn to swim in tempestuous waters of competition, away from the protected swimming pools. Indian firms were becoming global players as per the need of the hour. The search for identifying new competitive advantages must begin in right earnest, he added.

Comparing Indian industries with Chinese ones, he pointed out that Chinese were good at making simple things in large batch size adding what India lacked in manufacturing capacities could be made up in capabilities for design innovations and by moving up the value chain. He said that in today's environment, the primary focus had to be on the strategy and quality of microeconomic business management and the goal must be to achieve higher levels of efficiency and productivity.

About Indian economy, he said that we must rejuvenate and revitalize the old economy with the new economy tools.

Dr. Rangarajan suggested that India must take a pro-active stand in the next round of trade negotiations and articulate its demands focusing on what it wanted from the global trading system.

As in the past, IRIS '02, was an exciting festival that witnessed the unleashing of creativity and managerial expertise of the participants drawn from the leading B-Schools from all over the country. PGP ADMISSIONS AND FINANCIAL AID

Admissions

The fifth batch (2002-2004) of the two-year Post-Graduate Program in Management (PGP) offered by the institute, attracted 74,408 young graduate / post-graduate applicants, compared to previous year's 47,639, registering an increase of 56%.



While the attendance ratio of the shortlisted candidates appearing for Group Discussion and Personal Interview during the first three years – 1998, 1999 and 2000 was low, it improved considerably during the subsequent two years – 2001, 2002.

During the year under review, we had received applications from 8 candidates living abroad (NRIs) as against just one in the previous year. Their GMAT (Graduate Management Aptitude Test) scores are considered in lieu of the CAT scores, as is done by other IIMs.



Seven hundred and ninety four of 74400 (1.07%) CAT applicants and 3 of the 8 GMAT applicants were shortlisted and called for GD and interview. Of these, 677 CAT applicants and two GMAT applicants attended the GD and interview.

In all 396 successful candidates, which include 368 General, one GMAT, 18 scheduled caste, 5 scheduled tribe and 4 physically challenged applicants were offered admission to the PGP 2002-2004 batch. Out of these, 63 including 59 General, one GMAT, and 3 scheduled caste applicants accepted our offer of admission.

PLACEMENT

Final Placement 2003

The final placement for the fourth batch was held from February 15 to 17, 2003. The entire batch was placed within three days. A handful of PPO's (Pre Placement Offers) offered to the students after their successful stint at summer training and a few lateral placement offers further boosted the process.

A total of 41 companies registered for the placement process at IIM Indore. However some companies couldn't be accommodated due to the non-availability of students at their allotted time. A total of 65 jobs were offered to the students in the process. The prominent recruiters in campus included ICICI Bank, Infosys, PepsiCo India and Asian Paints. Infosys gave the largest number of offers - 8, with HCL Technologies coming a close second with 7 offers followed by Pepsi and IOCL with 5 offers each. The highest salary was Rs. 12 lakh and the average salary offered to the students was Rs. 5.64 lakh.

Summer Placement 2003

Almost all the big names of India Inc. turned up to recruit the PGP Participants for their summers. The companies, like ICICI Bank, Citibank, came with a mindset to recruit a few – went back taking a large number; reflective of the caliber of the students and the company's satisfaction levels about the performance of summer trainees of previous batches and the institute's 3-year old alumni.



Well known firms visiting the campus included banks like Citibank, ICICI Bank, Standard Chartered Bank, UTI Bank, and IDBI Bank, the FMCG leader Hindustan Lever Ltd. and other greats like Marico Industries, paint giant Asian Paints, Britannia, Pepsi and Coca-Cola from the foods and beverages, automobile leaders like Ashok Leyland and Eicher Motors, and GE Capital International Services from the services sector. All the sectors were well represented with Ranbaxy and Wockhardt from the burgeoning pharmaceutical sector, Larsen & Toubro, Madura Coats and H&R Johnson from the manufacturing world and AF Fergusson in consultancy industry. IT services had a significant presence with the industry leaders like Tata Consultancy Services, Wipro Ltd., CSC India visiting the campus. For the first time in the history of the institute, an NGO, BASIX offered a summer project to one of the students. Companies as diverse as the RPG group to the telecom companies like Bharti Telenet, Escotel Mobile to public sector behemoths like Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO), Indian Railway Catering and Tourism Corporation (IRCTC), participated in the summer placement process.

Thirty-one companies turned up to recruit all the 58 first year students and as many as 67 offers were made. ICICI Bank led the way with as many as 7 offers followed closely by other banks like Standard Chartered with 5 offers and Citibank and IDBI Bank with 4 each. The stipends ranged between 9,500 per month and Rs. 20,000 per month.

Executive Post-Graduate Program in Management

IIM Indore successfully launched its first Executive PGP program in September 2002. The Program has gained recognition in the industry in the first year itself. The first batch comprises 53 participants representing public and private sectors like Tata, Bharti-Telenet, Colgate-Palmolive, ACC Cement, Birla Sunlife, Ministry of Railways, Central Excise, NTPC, and SAIL.

Executive-PGP is a uniquely designed program for the working executives. The objective of the program is to provide an opportunity for the practicing executives to enhance their knowledge and skills continually.

The Program is designed specially for Graduates with a minimum of five years of managerial experience. Organizational sponsorship is desirable but is not a compulsory requirement for the program. The selection to this Program is based on multiple criteria such as the performance of the candidate in the written test (CAT 2002), the group discussion/interview, past academic record and work experience.

This Program has been developed on the lines of well-known internationally recognized Executive MBA programs. The duration of eighteen months has been divided into six terms of three months each and the participants need to attend the campus only for 15 days during each term. Each term is further divided into three modules, i.e., Pre-campus, on-campus and post-campus modules. Contact classes are also being held towards the end of every term in metro cities like Bangalore, Delhi, Kolkata, Mumbai, and Indore.

The first four terms have compulsory courses. During these terms, the participants are offered the foundational courses and the courses in the basic functional areas. The fifth term has both compulsory and elective courses. In the fifth and the sixth terms, the participants can choose the electives from a wide range of electives offered by the institute which will enable them to gain a deeper knowledge in their areas of special interest.

The pedagogy is a judicious mix of lectures, case discussions, project work, term papers, role play, seminar presentations, assignments, films, and management games.

On successful completion of the program, the Indian Institute of Management, Indore, would award the participants the "Executive Post-Graduate Diploma in Management".

FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Indian Institute of Management, Indore offered its first restructured Faculty Development Program (FDP) between the period April 1 and June 21, 2002 under the title "International Teachers Development Program for Management Educators". The Program was well appreciated by all the 26 participants who attended this program. This is also evident by the fact that we have been receiving queries from faculties of various colleges/universities about the Program.



This program was designed to help the participants identify teaching practices that successfully meet today's educational challenges and expectations, drawing attention to educational philosophies and pedagogical theories, module design, instructional strategies, pedagogically sound use of IT and assessment. After undergoing the program, the participants acquired the basic teaching skills like ability to lecture, conduct tutorials, implement the concepts of teaching and learning in higher education and use innovative ideas in pedagogy. The participants also learned to manage students by adopting a client-centered approach and attitude to learners, listening to learners, welcoming student evaluation and complaints, and turning them into improvements. The Program also covered topics such as how to manage themselves through self-organization, use of time, self-appraisal and managing conflict and change and, finally, to move from merely good traditional teaching to outstanding innovative teaching resulting in enhanced learning outcomes.

As a part of the Program a series of guest lectures were also organized on various topics, viz., "Institutional Building", "IT Strategy", "Knowledge Management" "Pedagogical Interventions in Management Education", and so on. The FDP concluded on June 21, 2002 with a valedictory program where Prof. Ashok Chandra (Former Special Secretary, Ministry of HRD) gave away the certificates to the participants on their successful completion of the programs. Mr. Raman Madhok (Director & CEO Jindal Iron & Steel Company Ltd., Mumbai), who was present on this occasion, also addressed the FDP participants.

MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

The Management Development Programs (MDPs) at the institute were started during the academic year 2000-2001. The MDPs aim at delivering short-term quality programs for competency development of working executives. This is achieved by discussing the latest developments in management thinking and offering analytical insights and skills. The programs are designed to meet identified training needs which cover the latest concepts and techniques in functional and general management areas.



In the year 2002-03, six programs were successfully conducted and sixty-four executives from private and public sectors and government departments participated in these programs. These programs were offered covering functional areas of Marketing, Human Resource, Finance, Logistics & Supply Chain, Organizational Behavior, and Data Mining.

COMPUTING FACILITIES

IIMI has world class, state of the art information technology tools to meet its computing and communication needs. These include powerful Network Server, dedicated Internet and E-mail access, Electronic Library, Desktop PCs, Multimedia PCs and Laser/ DeskJet/ Dot, Matrix printers, etc.

All the computing tools are interconnected through 100 MBPS Fast Switched Ethernet Network using fiber backbone and 10 MBPS dedicated access Cat-5 cable.

Every room of the hostel has been provided net connectivity such that participants can connect to the institute network to provide round the clock access to resources on the net. Internet access is provided using 512 KBPS leased line through VSNL. Institute is also providing remote access services through 16 Modems RAS server.

Institute has heterogeneous network, mainly environment of Windows NT / 2000 and Linux 7.X. Faculty, Participants, Administration, and Library servers are running on Windows NT/2000, while the Webserver and mail server are running on Linux

Situated in a picturesque surrounding on the outskirts of Indore adjoining the Agra -Bombay National Highway on the BOT road connecting Indore to Pithampur, the site is representative of the Malwa plateau – undulated, with the plateau right in the centre, where the Academic Complex is taking shape.

The strong regional influences such as architecture of Mandu and climatic factors have been studied to evolve a simple, functional but modern architectural built form.

The campus is envisaged to be intelligent, sensitive to environment as also to physically challenged individuals. Rainwater harvesting, recycling of water and Solid Waste Management are some of the tools by which we propose to make this campus environment friendly.

Construction work is in progress and some of the facilities such as Hostels; Utility I, II, and III, Dining & Kitchen and Faculty Block are fast getting completed.

The work on Administration Block, Computer Centre, Classrooms, Library and other services such as road, internal & external electrification, water supply, etc. is also making good progress.

The first phase of the campus will be completed shortly.

1.1 The Indian Institute of Management, Indore was established in the year 1996 as a Centrally funded autonomous institution and registered under the Madhya Pradesh Societies Registration Act, 1973 in October 1996.

The entrustment of audit of the accounts of the Institute to the Comptroller and Auditor General of India under Section 20(1) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 initially for the period from 1996-97 to 2000-01, has been further extended for a period of five years from 2001-02 to 2006-07.

As per schedule 5 to Balance Sheet, the fixed assets also include work-in-progress of Rs.2,437.02 lakh. This should have been shown separately under the head "Capital-work-in-progress."

2.2 Understatement of Assets

The institute was in possession of 193.42 acres of land donated by the State Government, the cost of which had not been accounted for in the accounts of the institute. Due to value of land not having been exhibited in the fixed assets in the Balance Sheet, it has resulted in understatement of assets to that extent.

3. Income and Expenditure Account

3.1 Overstatement of Expenditure

The depreciation valuing Rs.386.46 lakh pertaining to previous years was charged in Income and Expenditure Account for 2002-03 which has resulted in overstatement of expenditure to the extent of Rs.386.46 lakh.

4. Other Irregularities

4.1 Unspent Grant

There was an unspent grant of Rs.1,138.26 lakh at the end of 31.3.2003. It should have been shown as 'returnable' to the Government in the liabilities side of the Balance Sheet.

4.2 Non furnishing of Utilization Certificates to the Government

Indian Institute of Management Indore has utilized Rs.2,026.82 lakh out of the total grant of Rs.4,811 lakh during 2002-03 but utilization certificates were not furnished to the Government.

4.3 Physical Verification

The physical verification carried out for the year 2002-03 is incomplete as the assets were not actually physically certified by the authorized officer. These were certified on the basis of undertakings obtained from the department heads.

5. Effect of Audit Comments

The net impact of the comments given is that expenditure overstated by Rs.386.46 lakh in Income and Expenditure Account.

SCHEDULE 14

NOTES FORMING PART OF ACCOUNTS

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:-

A. ACCOUNTING CONVENTION

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting.

B. INVENTORY VALUATION

The inventories of Stationery, Stores, etc., are valued at cost following the FIFO method.

C. FIXED ASSETS

Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition inclusive of inward freight, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition less accumulated depreciation.

D. DEPRECIATION

The Institute from this year has started charging depreciation on fixed assets with retrospective effect from the year 1997-98. Depreciation on all fixed assets is provided on WDV method at the rates specified in Income Tax Act, 1961 relevant to that year. Depreciation on additions after 30th September is charged at half of the actual rate. The depreciation so charged has been debited to Income & Expenditure Account due to which **excess of expenditure over income** is increased by Rs. 4,90,67,998.97 out of which a sum of Rs. 3,86,46,217.99 relates to previous years. If depreciation had not been provided the **excess of expenditure over income** would have been reduced by Rs. 4,90,67,998.97.

E. GOVERNMENT GRANT

Government grants are accounted on the basis of sanction received. The Institute has first time received Non Plan Grant of Rs. 3,04,00,000/-, which has been credited to the Income & Expenditure Account. The Plan Grant of Rs. 4,70,00,000/- has been credited to the Grant-in-Aid Account as per the practice followed in earlier years.

F. LEASE

Lease rentals are expensed with reference to lease terms.

G. RETIREMENT BENEFITS

The Institute hitherto accounted for encashment of accumulated leave only in the year of payment. However, from this year, the same is accrued and provided for on the basis of arithmetical calculations. Due to this change, the Institute has provided for the accrued liability of Rs. 15,69,919/-, which has resulted in the expenditure for the year being higher by this amount.

Since the Institute has completed its 5 yrs, provision for gratuity of Rs. 1,66,529/- is made on the basis of GOI rules. .

H. FOREIGN EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are accounted at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of transaction.

2. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS: -

Estimated value of contracts remaining to be executed on capital account and not provided for (net of advances) Rs. 3, 62,21,756.31 (Previous year Rs.12,72,85,143/-).

- 3. In the opinion of the Management, the current assets, loans and advances have a value on realization in the ordinary course of business, equal at least to the aggregate amount shown in the Balance Sheet.
- 4. In view of there being no taxable income under Income Tax Act, 1961, no provision for Income Tax has been considered necessary.
- **5.** Corresponding figures for the previous year have been regrouped / rearranged, wherever necessary.


